How a school schedules its time for students and adults has a big impact on student learning and teacher growth. Whether you are looking at common planning time, finding time for student support, creating advisory programming, or scheduling extension activities for students, being thoughtful about the schedule is important. Changing a school's schedule, particularly at the high school level, is challenging, but can be done.

#### **In this workshop, participants will:**

- Examine various ways to use time to meet the diverse needs of learners, including the scheduling of supports/interventions as well as opportunities for learning extensions.
- Explore how schools can develop effective advisory programming.
- Understand how increasing collaborative time for adults can improve schools.
- Experiment with engaging teaching strategies that utilize different scheduling options.
- Explore a variety of resources and technology that can increase student engagement.
- Discuss strategies for proposing and implementing scheduling changes.

**Ted Hall** has been on the cutting edge of school transformation over the past 20 years. An accomplished principal of several high schools in New England, Ted has also worked for two of the most prominent school reform organizations in the country—the Coalition for Essential Schools/Annenberg Institute for School Reform at Brown University and the National School Reform Faculty. For two years he worked with Ted Sizer at Brown University where he designed and implemented professional development programs, particularly for math and science teachers. While serving on the Institute's Governance Council, he also taught "The Craft of Teaching."
